
# IMPACT OF CHILDHOOD SEXUAL ABUSE ON RESILIENCE AND SENSE OF PARENTAL COMPETENCE

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
### Introduction



Competence (SPC)
 Mothers with a history of childhood sexual abuse show less

confidence in themselves as parents<sup>1</sup>.

• Unique impact of sexual abuse on parenting can be reduced when other forms of childhood maltreatment are addressed<sup>2,3,4</sup>.



Resilience

- Childhood sexual abuse impacts victims' adaptive functioning and resilience<sup>5</sup>.
- Parent's resilience may mediate the effects of childhood sexual abuse experience on parenting<sup>6</sup>.

### Methods



Online survey.



Childhood Trauma Questionnaire – Short Form<sup>7</sup>.



Questionnaire d'Auto-Evaluation de la Competence Educative Parentale<sup>8</sup>.



Connor and Davidson Resilience Scale<sup>9</sup>.

# Sample



1904 mothers of children from 3 to 8 years old.



52% Belgian, 41% French, 7% Other.



84% have no financial difficulties, 15% have financial difficulties, 1% are unable to cope financially.



35% Graduate, 31% Master, 28% Secondary, 2% PhD.




23% have been sexually abused during childhood (71% extrafamilial).



53% have experienced at least one type of childhood abuse, 35% have experienced more that one type.


### Results

The effect of **childhood sexual abuse** on SPC was **not significant** ( $\beta$  = -.05, p = .05), while the effect of **childhood intrafamilial maltreatment** on SPC **was** ( $\beta$  = -.19, p <.00).




#### Significant partial mediation of resilience :

indirect effect = -.08, p < .000, total effect = -.20, p < .000The model explained 27% of the variance of the mothers' SPC



### Significant full mediation of self-confidence:

indirect effect = -.14, p < .000, total effect = -.20, p < .000 The model explained 27% of the variance of the mothers' SPC



### Discussion

The impact of childhood sexual abuse on SPC is indirect and explained by the effect of cumulative childhood abuse

> Factors influencing SPC are not explained by the sexual abuse itself. Childhood sexual abuse impacts mothers' SPC when it occurs in situations of repeated and multiple abuse where children are subjected to a chaotic and disorganized family context.

#### Cumulative childhood abuse reduced SPC of mothers

- > This study confirms the importance of taking into account mothers' childhood experiences to better understand their parenting difficulties and to provide a fitting intervention.
- > Interventions with mothers exposed to childhood abuse would be more effective when they are sensitive to SPC. Those interventions should focus on reinforcing adaptive parenting behaviors rather than criticizing maladaptive parenting behaviors.

Total resilience partially mediates the link between cumulative childhood abuse and SPC. **Self-confidence** emerges as the strongest mediator and as an **important protective factor**.

> Interventions offered to mothers with a history of childhood abuse should target the reinforcement of self-confidence, which in turn would contribute to increase SPC.
